Welcome to Black History Month 2016!

CRER hopes you enjoy this year's programme of events and that you will be encouraged to play your part in challenging racism in Scotland.

All too often, our schools and history books do not include the history of African, Caribbean and Asian people in this country; people who often have a direct link with Scotland through slavery, colonialism and migration. Recently, even the United Nations Committee for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination (CERD) recommended "that Scotland's school curricula (should) contain a balanced account of the history of British Empire and colonialism, including slavery and other grave human rights violations."

We hope that Black History Month provides an opportunity to learn, understand and honour the role that Black/Minority ethnic men, women and children have played in shaping both Glasgow and Scotland's history. We strongly believe that a better understanding of Scotland's past is needed if we are to build a truly anti-racist future for us all.

Sadly though, despite 50 years of race equality legislation, Black/Minority Ethnic people still face serious disadvantages including higher rates of poverty, lower rates of employment and a range of health inequalities.

This year's front cover is a fragmented portrait of Lamaya, a 12 year old from Glasgow. It has been created using offensive words which she has been called, a number of inappropriate questions which she has been asked, and other comments which have been made about her. These words have come from neighbours, classmates, school staff and strangers, and shows that racism is still a serious issue for all of us in Scotland and needs to be tackled more effectively. We need to build a society that isn't just non-racist but rather one that is pro-actively anti-racist.

Black History Month 2016 has once again provided the opportunity for CRER to work in collaboration with individuals, community groups and voluntary and public sector organisations. As always, this year's programme would not be possible without the support of our friends, partners and funders. We are sure there is something for everyone and we look forward to you joining us in this celebration of Black History.

Africa in Motion Film Festival 2016

Africa in Motion is Scotland's major annual celebration of African cinema and is delighted to return for the 11th year to bring to audiences in Edinburgh and Glasgow a wide variety of creative stories from across Africa.

The creative and thought provoking programme takes on bold narratives through a range of features, documentaries and shorts from across the continent. From twisted love stories in North Africa, including films Much Loved and As I Open My Eyes; to a folk story from rural Ghana entitled Nakom; to one of the first films ever made in the Tuareg language, Rain the Color of Blue with a little Red in it, paying homage to the cult classic, Purple Rain; to films looking at the Pan-African revolutions in Dakar and Cuba 1966; to the political radicals of South Africa in the film, Kalushi: The Story of the Solomon Mahlangu; to reimagining of notions of Africa through science fiction film, Naked Reality, the programme showcases filmmaking talent emanating from Africa. The programme is once again packed with an eclectic array of director Q&As, discussions, children's workshops and more.

Culinary Legacies of Colonialism: An Anti-Colonial Menu



Africa in Motion's anti-colonial menu looks to discuss ancestral delicacies from the African continent pre-colonial rule. This one off dine and view event looks to discuss the politics and heritage of African cooking as one of the least experienced, least understood cuisines in the world, through the research of historical foods and lost recipes from all of Africa with the idea that the hangover of colonial rule also extends its legacy within the everyday food experience.

This communal dining experience will be followed by the film Black Girl.

This event is brought to you by Soul Food Sisters, Küche, African Challenge Scotland and Africa in Motion Film Festival.

This recently and beautifully restored version of Black Girl is pioneering Senegalese director Ousmane Sembène's first feature film, and is one of the first features by a director from sub-Saharan Africa. The film tells the tragic story of Diouana, a young Senegalese woman who finds work as a childminder for a French couple in Dakar. When the couple return to the south of France, she goes with them, dreaming of a life of luxury and fine clothes on the Côte d'Azur. However, things don't turn out as she planned. A very moving and beautifully filmed portrayal of the gradual breakdown of a fragile, young woman, this is a great opportunity to see one of the genuine classics of African cinema.

Race, History and Brexit: Exploring the Politics of Erasure and Documenting the Experiences of Black and Minority Ethnic Communities in Scotland Post Brexit

The media has reacted to a reported 60% spike in racist attacks in the wake of the Brexit vote with soul-searching articles on race and racism in Britain. While welcome, these debates present racism as a 'new' phenomenon, erasing Black people's experiences of and resistance to everyday and institutionalised racism.

Glasgow Caledonian University's Dr Ima Jackson, Dr Akwugo Emejulu of the University of Edinburgh, and Claire Heuchan, Sister Outrider of Glasgow Women's Library, will lead an exploration of the politics and history of the erasure of race and racism in Britain and examine creative resistances developed by Black communities to counteract that experience. Bringing together activists, practitioners and academics, the seminar will attempt to understand this historic moment and develop collective strategies for social justice.

STRIKING WOMEN celebrates the significant role played by South Asian women in two industrial disputes in Greater London – the strike at Grunwick between 1976 and 1978 and the dispute at Gate Gourmet that erupted in 2005.

On a hot August afternoon in 1976, a small number of workers walked out of a photo-processing laboratory in Willesden, initiating a two year strike that has passed into the annals of the labour movement as one of the key events in trade union history. 29 years later, also on a hot August day in the peak holiday period, another group of workers – this time assembling airline meals rather than processing holiday snaps, also left their posts, initiating a lock out at Gate Gourmet, disruption at Heathrow at the busiest time of the year and a dispute that is still not finally settled, at least as far as some of the workers are concerned.

Through images, text and interviews, the exhibition puts these two disputes in the wider context of South Asian women's activism in the workplace and explores the similarities and differences between them, separated by thirty years but united by women's courage, their struggle against poor working conditions and low wages and by the stereotypical representations of minority women workers by the British press and in other texts of the time.

Most of what we know about the slave experience comes from the perspective such as plantation owners or abolitionists rather than the slaves themselves. Dress history, however, is a useful way of understanding the lives and cultures of people who have been left little direct historical record. This talk will look at where slave clothing came from in the eighteenth century (including links with Scotland), how these clothes were made and what these garments might have looked and felt like, giving some insight into the daily lives of eighteenth-century slaves.

Black Children in Scotland during the Age of Slavery

Recent research has identified the great importance of slavery and the slave economies in the history of Scotland. Yet, for more than a century and a half this has not been part of the national memory. Indeed, Scots have long prided themselves in not being involved in the evils of Black slavery. Their responses have been a combination of amnesia and denial. This lecture, covering the period from the end of slavery in the British Empire until today, looks behind the mythology to explain why this was so.


"Run Away From His Master": Jamie Montgomery and Freedom-Seeking Slaves in 18th Century Britain

This lecture will tell the story of Jamie Montgomery, a young enslaved boy who was brought from Virginia to Scotland in 1750 and who then escaped. The lecture will explore what it meant for an enslaved African to escape in eighteenth-century Britain, using examples drawn from the newspaper advertisements slave owners placed after their human property escaped.

Riots, Racism and Resistance in Imperial Britain

The race riot at the Broomielaw was the first of nine around British seaports shortly after the First World War. It came against a backdrop of job shortages when sailors' unions tried to preserve jobs for white locals by imposing a 'colour' bar, a policy that was soon applied to Black African and Caribbean colonial Britons. The riot was tied up with wider industrial unrest on Clydeside and took place only a few days before the notorious 'Battle of George Square'.



A Brief History of Chinese Culture

Reviving Scotland's Black History

Supported by the Heritage Lottery Fund, this year Africa in Motion Film Festival and the Coalition for Racial and Equality and Rights (CRER) worked in partnership to develop a young programmers scheme entitled 'Reviving Scotland's Black History'. We brought together five young aspiring film programmers from different backgrounds to take part in lectures, walking tours, site visits and seminars exploring Black heritage in Scotland and the UK. Through this project they discovered Scotland's links to slavery (through for example Glasgow's architecture), learnt about the various race riots that have taken place in Scotland from 1916 onwards and about Scottish activism against racism.
